lages are established. As their knowledge grew, these children decided to conduct a mission project to help ICC's children.


They also heard the stories surrounding ICC's shipment of

toys, clothes, shoes and dry food. Kallan Richards, a third grader, together with her family, sold special possessions and was able to bring in \$200 herself. ### A Personal Note

Dear ICC Family,

It was on the road in front of the playground of the mission school near our Salvador Children's Village, EL HOGAR ESCUELA ADVENTISTA. A staff member from the Children's Village was going by and saw a group of the children from the playground surrounding a little girl who was crying. With a closer look he saw she was bleeding on her head. He leaned down and asked her, "Que pasa? What happened?"

When she saw she was safe, she tried to tell her story. She was hungry as well as hurting from her injuries. Evidently, her mother had a drinking problem. In a drunken rage she had dragged her by the hair,



kicked and beat her and then thrown her into a thorn bush and left her there. When she got loose from the thorns she ran and ran, afraid that her mother would follow her. She didn't know where she was running, but she finally came to the play ground where she saw children.

Edalia was 11 when she escaped from her abusive mother. Our staff person took her to the office, where he filled out papers after investigating who she was. She ended up going back home, even though she didn't want to, but she was allowed to start attending the mission school. Even though she still lived at home, she continued attending school, but always told people she was from the children's village. Finally, when she was in the 7th grade she was allowed to move into the mission school dormitory. A sponsor was found for her and eventually, she and some of the other girls, sponsored through the Children's Village, were moved to the Village campus. Even though her mother lived near by, she agreed to leave Edalia, as well as her sister there, and a sponsor was found for her.

Edalia adapted to her new home. She especially loved to care for and work with the younger children. During her years in the Village, she was a willing worker, helping in the kitchen or wherever she was needed. She also worked tutoring some of the younger children in their studies. Her mother visited the girls, but Edalia could never forget the trauma she had received in her mother's drunken rages. At times the broken relationship with her mother troubled her, but she had bonded with her new caretakers and felt that the Village was her real home.

She finished her studies at the secondary school of the mission and then sponsors were found so she could go to Costa Rica at the Adventist University. She chose to study Education and today she is a qualified teacher in an Adventist grade school in another one of the Central American countries.

In spite of her traumatic childhood, even though she doesn't have a close relationship with her mother, she knows her mother's life is hard and struggles to find money for food, she wants to be able to help her some each month out of her salary.

Joel and Jenny were our directors at our Children's Village in Salvador after ICC took over the project there until recently. They told me Idalia's story. "Idalia says, 'My life is a miracle. I am alive and well because of what God has done for me. He brought me here where I found love and security, and where I learned to know and love Him. No matter where I go to work, I will always feel that this place is my real home."

Her story is typical of our ICC children as they grow up and find their place in life. They love to go back when it is possible and they want to always feel that they can call that Children's Village their home. That is the most important part of ICC, providing children a home, not just being one of many in an institution as is the case in most orphanages. They need the warmth and security of a Christian home, where they can learn about a God who is preparing them "forever homes" and to know that God loved them enough to send His Son, Jesus, to die for them. It means a lot for them to learn that Jesus cares about them individually, and has a plan for their life.

Our goal is to continue to give homeless children a home, even when the economy looks bleak. We have some room in some of our facilities for more children and I don't think there will ever be a time, until Jesus comes back, when there aren't hundreds of children out there in the cold, hostile world needing homes.
