A Personal Note

Give till it Hurts

It was a cool morning and I was about 30 miles from my home, alone in the forest. As I was walking up a hill toward a small rural house I heard them – running toward me, growling. As they charged towards me, I saw the look in their eyes. It was a look that said, "You are not welcome here. We will attack you."

I am sure you have heard the stories of people attacked, mauled and even killed by Rottweilers. So have I. But I'm getting ahead of my story.

20 years before, I received a parcel of land as part of a debt payment in a real estate transaction. The property was just outside of a small town. Based on the challenge to

"give until it hurts," I had decided to donate the sale proceeds of this property to International Children's Care.

Since the property was mountainous and covered in trees, I decided to "flag" the property boundary lines with red survey flagging. Having once been a full time land surveyor, I was looking forward to the task and the physical exercise. The real estate agent selling the property said this surveying would be very helpful in selling the property.

So, I drove to the property that morning, parked my car, found the first property corner and began flagging the boundary with my compass in one hand and a roll of red flagging in the other. No axe, gun, pepper spray or anything else. I had prayed about this gift and trusted the Lord was with me.

On a previous visit, I had noticed a small house on the adjoining property surrounded by a lot of rubbish. I remember thinking: "I wonder what type of a person lives there." This morning I had forgotten about that house. I was a long way from my car as I headed up, flagging this last property line.

As the two dogs bounded over the top of the hill and started toward me, mouths open, eyes locked with mine I said "Oh Lord help me!"

The next words from my mouth were, "Hi dogs! Nice dogs, nice dogs." I couldn't believe what happened next: Those two massive Rottweilers skidded to a stand-still right at my feet. After a few seconds, I started slowly backing up. They followed my every step, growling all the way.

After about 100 meters, they gave me more distance. I got to my car, got in and closed the door. Exhaling in relief, I prayed: "Thank You Lord for taking care of me and hearing my prayer."

I had thought the property would now be worth around \$35,000. I was anxious to hear what the agent thought it might sell for. She said \$65,000! I had my reservations as to whether we would get an offer anywhere near

that amount in this current economy. Within two months, she had sold the property for \$60,000!

Now when I look back, I realize I was not alone that morning. Oh yes, I know there were the two vicious dogs, but my guardian angels were also there and they saved me from a certain attack. "Give till it hurts" has a new and more powerful meaning for me now than it ever did before.

Happenings at ICC Nicaragua

Pineapple Crop "Starts"

Felix, director of the ICC children's village in Nicaragua, recently determined that he would plant a pineapple crop. He made a contact with a personal friend who also grows pineapples. Felix's friend was willing to assist him.

They went into the friend's field and began digging up starts from beside mature plants. After awhile it appeared that they had collected about 500 plants. Felix's friend was selling the starts for 1 Cordova (about 5 cents) each, so Felix decided he

wanted a few more. After leaving the field, Felix thought he had about 700. However, it turned out that there were more than 900 when the planting was done in the ICC garden.

Felix was so excited about having this new pineapple crop that he decided to get some more. When he went back to his friend's field he got another 1,000 starts. In all, nearly 2,000 plants are now flourishing in the ICC Nicaragua garden, and Felix only spent about \$100. Since many of the starts were pretty mature to begin with, they will start to produce in about 9 months.

Farm House Completed


A group from Canada who have been friends of our project for many years came to Nicaragua to do some other projects. They stopped by to see Felix and Angelica and asked them what they could do to help. Felix told them about the need to get the farm house finished – floor. doors and windows - so that someone could live in it and take care of the farm. These friends provided all the funds to do that. Now Felix has hired a couple to take care of the farm and live in that house.

First Fruits at DEWS Sweet Home

ick and Sharon Fleck have recently visited ICC's DEWS Sweet Home in India. You may recall in January we wrote that extensive flooding swamped our children's village, as can be seen in the photo below. There was great concern about the welfare of our campus gardens. However, God was merciful and the project recently harvested some of the produce.

Rick sent a report that included this photo of Kumari, our children's services director. She is displaying the first fruits of the string bean crop. They presented these beans as a special offering in church. This was to make a public declaration that we owe everything to God. Our ICC India family is very happy that they were able to give this special gift to God.

The older boys and house fathers at Sweet Home are the ones mainly responsible for working in the gardens. Together they have put forth the effort to make the gardens productive and beautiful once again. What a blessing that the gardens have recuperated after the devastating floods.
